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WELCOME

Welcome to the 6th Annual Ecological Farmers of Ontario Conference!

We are thrilled that you could join us for this year's conference: "Climate of Curiosity". This conference is especially notable as we celebrate EFAO's 40th anniversary – a milestone that highlights how far our shared curiosities have brought us: from a handful of farmers curious and driven to grow food in a different way, to what is now a full-fledged food and farming movement.

We have reached a tipping point where the urgency of climate change requires bold and immediate action. And it is becoming increasingly clear that ecological and regenerative farming is a critical part of the solution. This year's conference program is designed to help farmers as they strive to mitigate and adapt to the realities of climate change, while also exploring how we can work together to grow this movement and bring about the far-reaching changes that are needed in our food system.

It's been 4 years since we started EFAO's Farmer-led Research Program, and it strikes me how applicable this question is to the organization and to the work of our farmer members. In fact, there may be no better word than curiosity to characterize ecological farmers' ongoing process of observing a piece of land and testing out new farming techniques and strategies that are specific to a particular place and ecosystem.

Curiosity implies not having all the answers. Keeping an open mind. Thinking outside the box. It acknowledges that we must come together to tackle the big challenges we face, through conversation, shared learning, and experimentation.

This year's conference program is full of examples of curiosity in action, through workshop topics and farmer-to-farmer roundtables that address questions like: How can farmers work together to build the tools they need? Can the landscape teach us how to store and distribute water on the farm to better manage droughts? How can we most effectively increase and measure soil organic carbon? How can we include reconciliatory justice into our everyday actions? What steps do we need to take to grow the ecological farming movement?

Thank you to everyone for making these conversations possible. When we come together, we can build upon our individual knowledge and questions to create a true climate of curiosity. Here's to acting on what we learn this week and to using our collective curiosity to build an Ontario where thriving ecological farms are the foundation of our food system.



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KEYNOTE SESSIONS

Lessons from the Back Forty: How Curiosity Built the EFAO and Brought Me Home

Tuesday 6:00pm (Part of EFAO's 40th Anniversary Celebration) **Windows Ballroom**





Weaving together her own personal narrative of growing up on, leaving, and returning to her family's ecological farm with the origins of and growing movement of the EFAO; Katrina McQuail explores how curiosity, hope, and community continue to shape the regenerative agriculture movement.

Katrina McQuail owns and operates Meeting Place Organic Farm, with assistance from her partner Ben and support from other family members. They raise certified organic pastured pigs, grass-fed cattle and meat chickens. They farm with Suffolk-Punch draft horses, have a couple milk goats and an old apple orchard from which they make their apple butter. They also have a pet pig named Pickle. They are part of the Southwestern Ontario C.R.A.F.T farm network, committed to experiential and practical education for prospective farmers.

What Would Soil Do? Taking Guidance from Nature to Grow the Movement Wednesday 10:30-11:30am

Michelle Holliday will share stories of her work helping to grow the regenerative agriculture movement, as well as parallel movements in other sectors. In particular, she'll share the small number of "fertile conditions" that all living systems require – and that we as a community must cultivate if we are to grow the ecological farming movement within Ontario.

Michelle Holliday is a consultant, facilitator, author and researcher living in Montréal. Her work centers around a view of communities and organizations (including farms!) as dynamic living systems – much like the living soil. Michelle brings people together and helps them discover ways they can feel more alive, connect more meaningfully with each other, and serve life more powerfully and effectively through their collective action. She is the author of the highly acclaimed book, The Age of Thrivability: Vital Perspectives and Practices for a Better World.

Join Heather Pritchard for a keynote presentation that explores our relationship to land and the necessity of being in community as we work toward the creation of a sustainable local food system. She will share stories and examples of her work with the growing cooperative movement in Canada including an update on the Foodlands Cooperative of BC - a provincial land trust.

Heather Pritchard is the leading land and farm co-op developer in Canada. Heather has been directly involved in the incorporation of 3 land/farm co-ops but has mentored many others in British Columbia where the model is successful and thriving. She has experience with various models and styles of land based co-ops, understanding the intricate nuances of how they all work. Her knowledge is so valuable to emerging land/farm based co-ops.

The Web of Life: How Behaviour Links Soil and Plants with Herbivores and Humans

Belleville Room



This workshop will explore how behavior links the health of soil, plants, herbivores, and humans. Resource availability influences the species and behaviors of organisms that live in soil, which affects the varieties, chemical characteristics, and behaviors of plants. Unlike costly infrastructures such as corals and fences, understanding and implementing behavioral principles and processes costs little because they don't depend on fossil-fuels.



Dr. Fred Provenza is professor emeritus of Behavioral Ecology in the Department of Wildland Resources at Utah State University where he directed an award-winning research group that pioneered an understanding of how learning influences foraging behavior and how behavior links soils and plants with herbivores and humans.

Advantages and Techniques of No-till Vegetable Farming Sagonaska Room





This workshop will begin with a discussion of the motivations for transitioning a farm to no-till, including some of the negatives associated with tillage and the benefits linked with reducing or eliminating tillage. The broad methods for practicing no-till will be presented, guiding participants through the process of selecting and critiquing suitable no-till methods for their farms.



Andrew Mefferd is the editor of Growing for Market magazine, and author of The Greenhouse and Hoophouse Grower's Handbook and The Organic No-Till Farming Revolution. He spent seven years in the research department at Johnny's Selected Seeds, traveling internationally consulting with researchers and farmers on the best practices in greenhouse growing. He puts what he learned to use on his own farm in Maine.

Palatability is not just a matter of taste; rather, it is a relationship between animals and environments. Understanding this relationship has created opportunities for people to consider the costs and benefits of cafeteria mineral supplements; to train livestock to eat (invasive plants) or avoid (poisonous plants, grape vines in vineyards, young trees in forest plantations) particular plants; and to rejuvenate landscapes for the benefit of both wild and domestic animals.

No-till Vegetable Systems for Small Farms

Come learn about the different methods for doing organic no-till: mulch grown in place (i.e. the roller-crimper method) vs. mulch applied to the soil (compost mulch, deep straw mulch, and cardboard mulch), vs. non biodegradable mulches that are used for solarization or occultation. Find out how to decide on the method that's right for your farm and how to implement it.

Building Compost to Boost Soil Biology

The benefits of ecologically complete composts are infinite. Participants will leave this workshop knowing the key principles behind building a compost recipe that suits their respective situations, how to decide which method or combination of methods is logistically best for their farms, as well as practical guidance for tending to their compost piles with confidence.

Vivian Kaloxilos founded Docterre in 2015, after studying under Dr. Elaine Ingham of Soil Foodweb Inc. Docterre is a consulting service and laboratory which offers regenerative soil services in Quebec and Canada, providing assistance and support in educational, scientific and practical applications of soil regeneration. In 2017, she was one of the creators of the "Living Soil Symposium" in Montréal.

Intro to Keyline Design

Colonization of Seed

This workshop explores the intersection of seed and colonization through an Indigenous lens. Beginning with the Mohawk Creation Story, we discuss seed in a Rotinonshyón:ni (Six Nations) cultural context prior to contact, before tracing the stories of seed through the historical and contemporary colonial landscape. We use corn as a case study. We conclude by looking at ways that growers can protect seed diversity and honour our collective inheritance of ancestral seeds.

Erica Gray is Kanyen'kehá:ke Wolf Clan from Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory. She grew up on the land and in the garden on her parents' hobby farm, Shady Oaks, at the edge of Belleville. She still enjoys growing, saving and cooking with traditional and heirloom seeds with her family. Erica has studied non-profit project management and is a community volunteer with Rathinenhayén:thos and the Kenhtè:ke Seed Sanctuary. She is also learning Kanyen'kéha (the Mohawk language).

Fibre Farming in Ontario

Beth Fisher owns Stone Spindle Farm in Tamworth, Ontario where she raises suri and huacaya alpacas and has a dye garden. In the past she has been a grain farmer and raised Columbia and Polypay sheep and mohair goats. She sells naturally dyed fibre, roving, yarns, duvets, and woven and knit garments.

Kate Michalska has been raising Lincoln Longwool sheep, a critically endangered breed, organically for 20 years. Her dye garden supplies much of the material that she uses to colour her yarns. She sells fleece, naturally dyed yarn, roving, sheepskins, woven items and lamb at her St. Isidore Farm in Yarker, Ontario.

Presentation and discussion of the influence of cropping system and intensity, and management practices (rotation, tillage regime, cover crops), on soil health. Exploration of the linkage between soil health and changes in soil microbes and larger bodied organisms (earthworms, spiders, etc.).

Derek Lynch is Professor of Agronomy and Agroecology at Dalhousie University. From 2005-2015 he held the position as Canada Research Chair in Organic Agriculture. He has worked with many organic farms across Eastern Canada to tackle both production challenges and assess the environmental footprint of these systems. Current research projects focus on farming system impact on soil carbon, soil health and soil microbial dynamics.

Farm Labour Models: Three Approaches to Tackling Labour Needs Sagonaska Room





Farm labour is an ever-evolving question and balancing act as you seek the best model for your farm. Join representatives from three farms as they discuss their farm's labour story; how they came to employ their current model and others they've tried; what this looks like for their farm finances; and their labour retention and satisfaction.

Chris Krucker has been growing vegetables and meats organically for over 20 years with his wife and now adult children. The farm has operated as a CSA since its start and has also worked with local chefs over the years.

Heather Coffey and **Stephanie Laing** run Fiddlehead Farm in Prince Edward County, a 10 acre market garden that they started in 2012. Begun with wwoofers and interns, they quickly moved to locals on minimum wage, built some full year jobs, and in 2019 employed two locals and two migrant workers.

Let's hope so!

Reid Allaway is passionate about farming and appropriate technologies, ideally combined. A founding member of Tourne-Sol co-operative farm in les Cèdres, Quebec, Reid has been helping to build a successful CSA and organic seed enterprise while training future farmers and building cool stuff whenever time permits. Reid has been involved with the CAPÉ's Autoconstruction group since its inception.

Cover Crops for Soil Health in Field Crops

This workshop will begin with an overview of cover crop use strategies, including objectives that can be achieved with cover crops and opportunities for including them in field crop rotations. Farmers Eric and Max Kaiser will provide examples of their use and learnings from their experience with cover crops in their field crop production system.

Sebastian Belliard is a Soil Management Specialist for field crops with OMAFRA based in the Kemptville office and working primarily in Eastern Ontario. Sebastian left farming to join the Ontario Soil Survey's efforts toward soil classification and soil map renewal. He now works with field crop farmers in Eastern Ontario to test and develop strategies for improving and measuring soil health.

Father and son team Eric and Max Kaiser run Kaiser Lake Farms near Napanee, Ontario. On their nearly 1100 acres of cropland, they have focused on environmental stewardship and integrated no-till practices.

Second generation farmer **David Banbury** runs Banbury Grasslands with his family, where they raise 100% grass-fed beef on their Ontario farms.

The Economics of Transitioning and Maintaining Organic Field Crop Production

Participants interested in transitioning to organic production will be presented with various transition plans of crop rotations, costs/acre, and estimated yields and market price. Organic farmers who wish to maintain financial success will be presented with price premium averages and the latest on increasing yields or other strategies to maintain farm profitability.

As an urban farmer, experiential educator and Organic Master Gardener, **Eric Payseur** has been growing food for over 20 years. He is now the Regional Event and Education Manager for the Canadian Organic Growers (COG), based in Ottawa. He previously worked for the organic certification body Ecocert Canada. He is also an EFAO Board member.

Rob Wallbridge grew up on his family's dairy and cash crop farm in Eastern Ontario. He joined Thompsons Limited in 2016 as the Organic Specialist. Prior to that, he farmed commercially, worked as an organic inspector, did extension work for the Organic Meadow Co-operative, and consulted on organic agronomic, marketing, and certification projects.

She has a Bachelor of Arts, Honours in Indigenous Studies from Trent University, a Bachelor of Education from Queen's University, and holds a Masters of Adult Education from St. Francis Xavier University.
